The Quartet part of the larger ensemble — CCMC, as they describe themselves the rhythm section of the CCMC, play very close music which for the most part produces sonic bands of sound rather than solo and accompaniment type music, and hence the hot or cold: depending on expectations. Because the music is very much an A.C. current life style one cannot criticize the band for being laid-back. Excellent though the music was, the band has yet to formalise or informalise its attitude towards the audience between pieces/works/compositions. Quiet shuffling is no replacement for the capable sonic articulation or verbal explanation that the CCMCQ can, and did give. We look

Martha Rosler's archive show is a re-make and blow-up of her periodic postcards mailed last year under the titles McTowersMaid. In 14 plus one parts it tells the sad story of the evils that lie behind the social and edible ready-to-go counter. On the opposite wall we have Know Your Servant Series, No. 1. The American Waitress, Coffee-Shop Variety. A graphic display with plans outlining the etiquette and pecking-order within the well-known Capitalist tradition. Its entertaining to tell, but sombre to re-live what most of us have seen through off-season, part-time or ongoing employment.

#### Mr. Peanut and John Mitchell

Mr. Peanut introduced John Mitchell, who read from "The Rise and Fall of the Peanut Party," whilst Peanut clicked the eighty slides that accompanied the text. Followed by the tape "Off-the-air highlights of the Peanut Party Campaign" it brought out the platform and got the audience to side and the politics to its knees. Having just published (Air Press, Vancouver) a very good journal of the Peanut campaign an innerson tour was an obvious move, Couple Peanut campaign an in-person tour was an obvious move. Couple this with the Demo win of Jimmy Carter and the Peanut anthology was given a fresh breath of life — in fact a four-year term. As Mr. Peanut said: "We certainly intend to cashew on the peanut farmer's success." The second-time around: C.C.C.T. production at CATV was similar but far better media-placed with John Mitchell (see also Mitchelangelo) giving clearer tones reading the Journal as a news-man; and artist-elect Peanut wrapping up with a tap-dance.

The manager thought we were crazy. He instantly got terribly suspicious: what did we care what was in the food? We had picked one of us to ask but were afraid she would get fired unless we said we all wanted to know and had thought of some possible changes. He was really uptight about the idea that we had actually gotten together to talk about anything and wouldn't answer any questions. He thought we were all going to ask for more money, in which case he'd let us all go, and he asked if we'd joined Women's Liberation. He wouldn't listen to the idea that business would boom. And he wouldn't say if he had any choice about food sources. We started to get annoyed, for sure.

We started asking customers--people--what they wished we would serve. A lot said "huh?" or "just burgers, like always" but a lot said things like "real food" or (surprise!) "cooked vegetables." What to do, we wondered?



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



#### PARACHUTE CENTER VIDEO

Parachute Center for Cultural Affairs now has a video access facility which makes available half inch studio recordings and mixing and externally usable portapak(s). The facility will also host monthly showings of tapes on Sunday afternoons — beginning January; the series will be called SUNDAY, VIDEO SUNDAY. All equipment usage will be subject to a proposal and booking procedure.

#### Access Policy:


Access is relative to the type and amount of equipment housed at Parachute. The following are our general access guidelines:

- Priority will be given to sectors of the community generally disadvantaged or ill-served by established community media outlets.
- 2. Potential users of the facility will have to demonstrate a capable priority for the **creative** use of video, either in its social or art applications.
- 3. The equipment is to be used only by non-commercial groups or individuals.
- 4. All users must be familiarised with the equipment: at regular intervals introduction sessions will be given and from time-to-time special workshops will be arranged.
- 5. We retain the right to limit or expand supervised accessibility depending on demand versus energy.

# CCCT

Calgary Contemporary Cultural Transmissions

C.C.C.T. is an experimental project (funded by Explorations) that allows us to encourage and pay artist-fees for video that is broadcast. As it is an experiment, we are limited to how many programmes we can sponsor: the person or group must have visited us and given a performance/reading/concert that we either video and broadcast or use ready-made material with an interview, etc.

C.C.C.T. also operates within the capabilities of Radio Cora, a co-op volunteer Radio Station. We have been operating the Parachute Show with Cora for some time; under C.C.C.T. it will expand into two programmes — we will also be cablecasting right out of the Center and hopefully we will be able to create several live transmissions.

As C.C.C.T. and Parachute Center Video are virtually one of the same we are constantly adding "programmes" to our tape archive (which can only be seen by visiting us). Look in the near future for document-specials (Archive) on the New Dalta Ahkri, the HP Show and the CCMCQ.
