on expectations. All individual masters, the shifting centrifuge is sometimes too subtle, or made-to-appear too easy for the audience. Mattes and Anson played guitar duets, Sokol's piano was not as exciting as it can be, but very little argument can ever be brought against Larry Dubin's constant percussion. Both fortunately and unfortunately the alive-dead, up-down attitude of improvisational
music and its makers is carried directly to the audience, and immediately. Because the music is very much an A.C. current life-style one cannot criticize the band for being laid-back. Excellent though the music was, the band has yet to formalise or informalise its attitude towards the audience between pieces/works/compositions.

Mr. Peanut and John Mitchell
Mr. Peanut introduced John Mitchell, who read from "The Rise and Fall of the Peanut Party," whilst Peanut clicked the eighty slides lights of the Peane the text. And he wouldn't say if he had any choice about food sources. We started to get annoyed, for sure.

We started asking customers--people-what they wished we would serve. A lot said "huh?" or "just burgers, like always" but a lot said things like "real food" or (surprise!) "cooked vegetabless." What to do, we wondeted?

Calgary Contemporary Cultural Transmissions
C.C.C.T. is an experimental project (funded by Explorations) that allows us to encourage and pay artist-fees for video that is broadcast. As it is an experiment, we are limited to how many programmes we can sponsor: the person or group must have visited us and given a performance/reading/concert that we either video and broadcast or use ready-made material with an interview, etc.

## PARACHUTE CENTER VIDEO

Parachute Center for Cultural Affairs now has a video access facility which makes available half inch studio recording and mixing and externally usable portapak(s). The facility will also host monthly showings of tapes on Sunday afternoons - beginning January; the series will be called SUNDAY, VIDEO SUNDAY. All equipment usage will be subject to a proposal and booking procedure.

## Access Policy:

Access is relative to the type and amount of equipment housed at Parachute. The following are our general access guidelines:

1. Priority will be given to sectors of the community generally disadvantaged or ill-served by established community media outlets.
2. Potential users of the facility will have to demonstrate a capable priority for the creative use of video, either in its social or art applications
3. The equipment is to be used only by non-commercial groups or individuals.
4. All users must be familiarised with the equipment: at regular intervals introduction sessions will be given and from time-to-time special workshops will be arranged 5. We retain the right to limit or expand supervised acces sibility depending on demand versus energy.
