Robert Bruce

At the end of April this year Professor Robert Bruce completes 21 years as a teacher at the School of Art and retires from University life.

Robert Bruce was born in Manitoba and schooled at the Winnipeg School of Art; Central School of Art and Design, London; Academie Grande Chaumière, Paris; Chicago; and the Art Students' League, New York. He spent nineteen years working as a designer and illustrator in Toronto, London, Paris and New York.

As an illustrator he executed cover-designs and illustrations for national publications in Canada, Britain and the United States and has designed and illustrated many childrens' books for American publishers.

As a designer his work has ranged from fabrics to whole ballets, to murals, ten of which he has executed in the Winnipeg area, the most recent being those in the Chamber of Commerce, Red River Community College and Grace General Hospital.

He is a former president of the Manitoba Society of Artists and Vice-President of the Art Director's Club of Winnipeg, and has sat on the Exhibition Committee of the Winnipeg Art Gallery. He has also made a study of urban esthetics in northern Europe on a short term Canada Council grant. He has exhibited paintings in National and International exhibitions that have been shown in the leading galleries of Canada, United States and Europe. Paintings are in the collections of the:

Before joining the staff of the School of Art in 1955 he taught for six years at the Albright Art School, University of the State of New York.

If we believe that aesthetics is the means by which we identify and order the communication function in art, then through the paintings and drawings of Bob Bruce, he is revealed to be a man with a keen eye for meaningful form and detail and with a perceptive eye for our frailties and foibles.

His work explicitly testifies to the power and excitement of colour and to the figural figments of shape, all invested with an implicit understanding of visual order within the two dimensional limits of surface. It is this latter comprehension which has suited him for the role of a muralist.

Having known Bob intermittently since our early years in the backstage scene shops of the Royal Winnipeg Ballet, I can confirm that the man revealed through his work is the man in fact. Warm, alert, demanding, inventive, disciplined, his commitment to his own work, and to his students, is total and deeply rooted, and tempered throughout with a puckish wit.


